

Riga, on the Daugava, is still a port city




- 12th Century to 1914 Baltics ruled by Germans, Polish, Swedish and Russians

- 1721 1918
 Part of Czarist Russia
- ~1870 ~ 1930

 Latvian art & commerce thrived
 Jugendstil, Art Nouveau











- Independent Republic of Latvia: November 18, 1918 to 1939
- Secret Molotov-Ribbentrop pact between Germany and USSR gave Baltics to the USSR in August 1939
- Invasion and occupation of Latvia by the USSR 1939 -1941







GDP per capita in USD







Country Economic Comparison

























Infant mortality rate: Riga and Latvia






Air Emissions from Stationary Sources (1000t)
